Presbyterian Blasts from the Past...



It was a happy day when First Presbyterian purchased the first church bell in Baraboo. It was hung outside the wooden building on 2nd Street. Soon after, the Methodists purchased a bell. And both bells rang long and hard for the July 4th celebration of 1854. Within a short time, according to the Baraboo newspaper, "some roguish boys procured cow bells and commenced opposition in good earnest. Together with the firing of firecrackers they kept up a din


and clatter until about 11:00 o'clock."

The photo above shows the steeple of our first church building, located about where the brick house next to the American Legion on Second Street is located. The German Methodist Church bought our original church building; later buying property adjacent to it and erecting a brick church. When the new brick church was completed, the old wooden church was demolished, and a brick parsonage was erected on the site of our original church.

The Presbyterian's first bell probably went into the new tower of the brick church, but the tower has been removed and the bell was probably sold. Martha Lange, who played organ for First Presbyterian for many years, grew up in the German Methodist Church and began playing for services there.

We met to receive feedback from the congregation in order to put together an application (known as an MDP), for candidates to reference. We received candidates that matched what our church was looking for in a pastor. During these months, the PNC met weekly on Monday nights.

Throughout the summer, the PNC worked diligently to review applicants and even interviewed a few who seemed like a good fit for our community and congregation. Unfortunately, these candidates did not work out.




All Saints' Day


In early Christian tradition, saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversary of a martyr's death—his or her "birthday" as a saint. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs that it was hard to give all of them their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, known and unknown.

All Saints' Day has a rather different focus in the Reformed tradition. Rather than putting saints on pedestals as holy people set apart in glory, we give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of the believers in this and every age. This is an appropriate time to give thanks to members of the community of faith who have died in the past year. We also pray that we may be counted among the company of the faithful in God's eternal realm.

All Saints' Day has been celebrated on November 1 since the year 835. Previously it had been connected with the Easter season as a feast of all martyrs.

GREEN TEAM NEWS!!

Two years ago, the Green Team received a grant from the Presbyterian Mission Agency to conduct environmental advocacy in our community. We chose to use the money to raise awareness of the environmental harm caused by single-use disposable plastic water bottles.

Bottled water in single-use plastic containers has become ubiquitous in our society during the past few decades. In addition to its convenience and availability, it is inexpensive, and nonprofit groups often purchase it in bulk and resell it at concession stands to raise funds.



Unfortunately, single-use plastics are not sustainable: most plastic bottles do not get recycled; energy cost in manufacturing and transporting the bottles contributes to climate change; and many bottled water companies have been accused of exploiting the communities from which they draw their water.

Additionally, microplastics that leach from the bottles may be harmful to human/animal health. All of these facts stand in contrast to what the PCUSA teaches about caring for God's earth. We also acknowledge that many nonprofits depend on the proceeds from sales of bottled water at concession stands to support their activities.

Our goal was to encourage nonprofits to switch to using more environmentally-friendly cartons of water at their events. Our grant allowed us to purchase 2 pallets (3,600 cartons) of drinking water cartons from "Just Water."



Just Water is a certified B-corp focused on sustainability and responsible stewardship. Unlike water sold in conventional plastic bottles, which are made from petroleum-based plastics, the cartons used by Just Water are made from 88% plant-based materials and other renewable resources, and have a 74% lower carbon footprint than similarly-sized plastic bottles.

During 2022 and 2023, these 3,600 cartons of water were distributed throughout the community to various nonprofit groups, at no cost to them. The groups were free to sell or give away the water as they wished. The cartons contain messaging about why Just Water is better for the environment than conventional single-use plastic bottles. We also added "First Presbyterian Church Green Team" labels to many of the bottles, to serve as a witness to the community.

A few of the many local organizations that benefitted from our donation of Just Water include: The Baraboo Acts Coalition, Powered Up Baraboo, Sauk County Queers and Allies, Baraboo Education Association, The Red Cross, Baraboo Riptide Swim Team, Baraboo Area Senior Center, Baraboo High School Athletics & Activities, Sauk County Historical Society, and the Lake Wisconsin Alliance. We hope that the groups that received our donation of water, as well as the 3,600 individuals who drank it, will consider alternatives to single-use plastic water bottles in the future.

Unfortunately, even water sold in cartons made of plant-based materials are not a perfect solution to reduce pollution. The best choice for the environment is to carry your own reusable water bottle and refill it from local sources of drinking water. Bottle-filling



stations are beginning to spring up in many public spaces including schools, libraries, churches, and parks. At events, **serve water in jugs or pitchers with reusable or paper cups**, instead of bottled water. Our lifestyle choices can add up to create a better future for God's creation!
